PUZZLE STRATEGY TIP: "INDEXING"

Sometimes when you're solving a puzzle, there's a point where you've figured out all the clues, but you don't know how to extract an answer from them. Often what you need to do is take one letter from each of the answers. *But which letter?* Well, if there's a number associated with each answer, and you haven't done anything with that number, you can try *indexing* into the answer by that number.

For example, look at a clue like this:

Birthday Boy (3)

Usually a number after a clue indicates the number of letters in the answer, but obviously the answer to the clue is "**Ryan**." That leaves the "(3)" as unused information. If you were to interpret this number as an index, you'd extract the third letter, **A**. Which is the grade that you'll get on your puzzle-solving exam! Congratulations!




